

### **Dawn Warner Letter From the Board President**

Dear Dunklin R-5 Stakeholders:

Fall is upon us here at Dunklin R-5. Homecoming was a success with all the festivities from spirit week to the victory on the football field at the Homecoming game. This is one of my favorite times of the school year! So much togetherness and so much school spirit! Watching the students of our district come together, from the elementary to the high school just demonstrates the true meaning of BLACKCAT PRIDE! This was also apparent by the many alumni who showed up to the Homecoming festivities also. I have said many times "Once a Blackcat....Always a Blackcat!"

As you are most likely aware we have a proposition on the November 8th ballot that is called Proposition Blackcat Pride. This proposition was narrowly defeated back in August and the Board of Education voted unanimously to try again and put this issue on the ballot in the upcoming November election.

I have seen a few things on social media that criticized us for calling the proposition - Proposition Blackcat Pride. These social media posts state that we are trying to disguise the fact that this is a tax increase to the community. That couldn't be further from the truth and I want to set that matter straight as well as share with you some insight on the proposition.

When we as a board discussed this issue and what to name it, we had been having discussions about our district and the needs of our district. In the beginning of the year when we chose to run this initially, we took information from the many Master Facility Planning community meetings. We looked at the projects that the attendees of those meetings had come up with as the things that our district really needed in order to improve our facilities and provide our students and staff with the best possible environment to enhance and encourage education. These attendees were staff members, parents and community members. The list they provided was 10 projects that totaled \$25 million dollars. We knew that \$25 million was a lot to ask for so we evaluated those projects and scaled back to the 6 projects on this proposition, which total \$13 million dollars. These projects are NEEDS for the district. The entire board, as well as the administrators and staff that were in these discussions, are people who, like most of you, have tons of Blackcat Pride! It is that pride in our district that truly exemplifies what this proposition is. We have such pride in our district that we are trying to do the things needed to

make our district better and to give our students the best learning opportunities that they so greatly deserve. We felt that based upon what we were trying to accomplish, the name Blackcat Pride was a perfect fit.

With that said, here are the facts about Proposition Blackcat Pride:

The Proposition will create funds to update the Dunklin R-5 campuses to create a more safe and secure learning environment. The Proposition is a \$.62 cent tax levy increase, which will generate \$13 million for the projects needed. If passed, the \$.62 cent tax levy would cost the homeowner of a \$100,000 home \$9.82 per month or \$117.84 annually.

Every facility that makes up our district would benefit from these funds. The majority of the money would be used to add classrooms at Pevely Elementary to address the overcrowding there, as well as add a safer, more secure entrance to the building. In order to do this, we would relocate the bus garage/transportation center to a different location. This would also help with the traffic issues that we currently see at this building. We would rework the entrance to Senn-Thomas and relocate their offices to provide a new safer more secure entrance at this building and at Taylor Early Childhood Center we would connect the two buildings and relocate the offices to provide a safer, more secure entrance at this location as well. At Herculaneum High School we would upgrade the science labs and renovate/upgrade the Robinson Gymnasium building. Many updates would be done to this building including the addition of air conditioning.

# Superintendent's Letter

First semester is in full swing and by the time this letter is published the first quarter will be completed. It has been a busy but good start to the school year. Fall Festivals at Taylor Early Childhood Center and Pevely Elementary were well attended. Homecoming was a great week for showing that Blackcat Pride. The softball team played for a district championship. Mrs. Jo Ann (Beckett) Williams Schomburg, Class of 1963, and Mr. William Sevier, Class of 1966, were inducted into the Blackcat Hall of Fame.

With fall also comes the release of Missouri Assessment Program (MAP) scores from the previous school year. This is our required assessment from the state. Student scores are reported in four categories: Advanced, Proficient, Basic and Below Basic. These scores are then used as part of our Annual Performance Report (APR) that will be released in November.

As we analyze our MAP scores we always want to know how are we doing compared to other comparable districts. Dunklin R-5 School District has 1583 students K-12 and 55.66% qualify for Free and Reduced Lunch. Across the state of Missouri we have identified 11 other districts that have an enrollment between 1298-1848 students and a free and reduced percentage between 51.30%-59.02. When we compared our percentage of students that scored advanced and proficient Dunklin R-5 is above the peer group average in English Language Arts, Science and Social Studies. Math was below the peer group average. While this is encouraging news the district strives for continuous improvement so we look to build on last years scores this year.

Over the past several years our free and reduced percentage has increased from 37% to the current level of 55%. With this increase the needs of our students have increased. The district strives to meet these needs as much as possible and we need the community's support to do so. In the coming months you are going to be hearing about a new organization within our community called Bright Futures Dunklin. The first goal of Bright Futures will be to meet basic student needs within 24 hours. Search for their Facebook page to learn more about the organization's mission.

### **Attend Today, Achieve Tomorrow**

We take our mission of "Educating today for a better tomorrow" seriously. In order to meet this mission and prepare our students for a better tomorrow, we need ALL of our students to be here EVERY day possible and to be ON-TIME to school. Being late chronically and being absent "here and there" can begin to add up quickly. Most of us can probably agree that it is a fairly obvious statement to say that kids that miss a lot of school are going to struggle. But when you look at what research tells us about the impact of attendance on student success, it is staggering:

- Missing more than the equivalent of 5% of school (8.5 days a year for Dunklin R-5) puts a student in the at-risk category for achievement and graduating on-time.
- Missing more than the equivalent of 10% of school (more than 16 days a year for Dunklin R-5) puts a student in the chronically absentee category and is a huge red flag and indicator of probable struggles ahead.

Our goal is to have 100% of our students attending school at least 90% of the time. We believe this goal is not only attainable but is absolutely necessary for us to meet our mission. We need all students, parents, and community members to help us meet this goal. Talk to your child's teacher, our administrative team or our counseling department if you have questions about how you can help us or if you are in need of assistance to improve your child's attendance. - Students who are chronically absent in K or 1<sup>st</sup> grade are almost 40% less likely to read on grade level by 3<sup>rd</sup> grade or to be retained. These students are then at much greater risk of dropping out of high school.
- Students who are chronically absent in 6<sup>th</sup> grade and beyond are 3 times more likely to drop out than to graduate from high school.
- 9<sup>th</sup> grade attendance is a better indicator of high school graduation than 8<sup>th</sup> grade test scores.



### **High School News**

### Letter from the High School Administration

The beginning of the school year has gotten off to a great start. The teachers and students have been working hard in the classroom and it is hard to believe the first quarter has come to end. We are enhancing the Continuous Improvement process by developing further the My Job, Your Job, Our Job philosophy as well as Baldrige in the Classroom. This approach to curriculum delivery puts emphasis on involving students and parents in the learning process. It was introduced to students during the last school year, and it involves students working with teachers at the beginning of the year to set up ground rules, learning objectives, and goals for each of their classes. Students are then introduced to different techniques in the classroom that help them track their progress and become more involved in their education. They are also provided with techniques in which they could use, with the teacher's guidance, strategies for how they learn classroom material - part of this approach is the use of data binders. Data binders are a way for students to track their grades and work. Much of this data is documented in the students' Chromebooks.

Students are required by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education to take state assessments during their K-12 education. High school students take four of these required assessments. The four tests are Algebra I, Biology, English II, and Government. These tests are given at the end of the school year to students that are taking these four courses. Although the test is given in four specific courses all courses taken previously prepare students for the EOCs. In other words, the student performance on EOCs is the result of material learned and mastered throughout their educational career. Last year, students took the exam on their Macbook laptop. Each student earned a score of below basic, basic, proficient, or advanced. The high school students did very well last school year with 72.5 percent scoring advanced or proficient on the four required End of Course exams. This translates to 72.5 percent of our students earning what is equivalent to a B or higher on the exam. This high score is a result of the hard work our students and teachers undertook last school year and in previous years, and I was extremely pleased and proud of our performance.

The high school conducted Parent/Teacher conferences on October 20. If you were unable to meet with your students teachers and would like to, please email their teacher to set up an appointment. Keeping an open line of communication with teachers can be very productive for the student, the parent/guardian, and the teacher. Email addresses of all teachers can be found on the high school page of the district website. Another helpful tool for parents/guardians is Parent Portal. Parent Portal allows parents/ guardians to keep track of student grades, attendance, and lunch accounts. You can also set up the program to alert you when an update or change has been made to your student's information. This is a great way to stay involved and track your student's performance at school.

#### A+ Information

The A+ Program requires all male students to register for the Selective Service if they are 18. Also, completion of the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) is required prior to graduation. We will be hosting a FAFSA help night in early spring. Detailed information will be sent home closer to the date.

#### National ACT Test Dates

December 10, 2016. Deadline to register is November 4.

February 11, 2017. Deadline to register is January 13.

April 8, 2017. Deadline to register is March 3.

June 10, 2017. Deadline to register is May 5.

Registration information is in the Counselors office. Test fee waivers are available for students who qualify for free/reduced lunch.

#### **District Testing**

Juniors will take the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery on November 21, 2016. The ASVAB is not only used as a tool for the Armed Services. This assessment is also used to assist our students with career exploration and in exploring their interests for future planning.

Freshman will take the ACT Aspire on November 21, 2016. The ACT Aspire is an early high school exam, linked to ACT College Readiness benchmarks and is the best predictor of performance on the ACT.

Juniors will take the State ACT Test on April 19, 2017. The State ACT results can be used for college entrance.

#### FAFSA Information for the Class of 2017

The *Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)* has changed starting with the 2017-2018 academic year. Families will now be able to submit their FAFSA earlier and use earlier income tax information.



The Board of Education of the Dunklin R-5 School District has responded to community feedback and voted unanimously to place **Proposition Blackcat Pride** on the **November 8<sup>th</sup>** ballot.

The proposition is a 62 cent tax levy increase. Because the levy will fund a "lease purchase," it will only require a simple majority for passage. Voter approval

### **Expand Pevely Elementary School**

Pevely Elementary was designed to house 725 students and is already overcrowded with a current enrollment of 830 students. Passage of Proposition Blackcat Pride would allow the District to add 14 new classrooms and rebuild the school entrance to improve student and staff safety.

Renovate the Herculaneum High School Gymnasium The current Robinson Gymnasium was built in 1964 and is in need of major renovations. Passage of the proposition would pay for renovated restrooms, renovated locker rooms and storage facilities, and a new concession stand. Also, air conditioning

of the levy will generate an estimated \$13 million that will be used to fund **6** major projects:

would be added for the first time.

### Build a New Transportation Facility

In order to expand Pevely Elementary, the District must move the bus garage to another location. This would also help improve the traffic flow at Pevely and result in increased safety and convenience.



### Construct a new Entrance at Senn-Thomas Middle School

Passage of the levy would allow the District to renovate and relocate the main entrance for improved security and visibility. The construction would include new offices and an update for the nurse's clinic.

# Connect the Taylor Early Childhood Center with the Butterfly Wing

Connecting the two buildings and adding office space at the early childhood center would improve safety and eliminate exposure to inclement weather for students and staff.


### Renovate the Science Labs and Classrooms at Herculaneum High School

The science rooms at HHS have not been updated since the early 80's. Passage of the levy would allow the district to renovate three classrooms/science labs.

**Proposition Blackcat** Pride aligns with the feedback received from the community phone survey, the Master Facility Plan recommendations and the recent demographic study. District enrollment has increased by 353 students since 2004, or about 29% to our current enrollment of 1,583. The demographic projections indicate the District's total enrollment could be as high as 2,186 students by 2020. Voter approval in November would allow the District to make needed additions, improvements and safety upgrades for the students in our community.



The Dunklin R-5 School District works continuously to be good stewards of taxpayer dollars and use resources wisely! The District has not passed a Bond Issue or increased the debt service since 2008.
