Superintendent's Letter

Recently I did a series of budget presentations for the Board of Education and staff. I would like to share some of that information with you in this Superintendent Letter. The school district has three sources of revenue.

- 1. Local revenue, which includes local taxes, fines, and earnings on investment
- 2. State revenue, which includes foundation formula, classroom trust fund, transportation, early childhood education and Parents as Teachers
- 3. Federal revenue includes Title I, Title II, IDEA and school lunches

Here is a table showing the percentage of revenue from each of these sources and the state averages.

<u>Source</u>	Dunklin R-5	State Average
Local	48.63%	55.91%
State	43.69%	34.93%
Federal	7.68%	9.16%

As you can see from the table local revenue accounts for 48.63% of the revenue but this is below the state average of 55.91% and state revenue accounts for 43.69% compared to the state average of 34.93%. What this means is that the district is more dependent on state revenue than other school districts in the state. That is important for you to be aware of because when the state is discussing cuts to education, it affects Dunklin R-5 School District more than other districts that are less dependent on state revenue.

This is a change for Dunklin R-5 School District over the past 10 years. During the 2007-08 school year 63.93% of revenue came from local sources while the state only provided 30.69%. The reason why this has happened is because of the new foundation formula, increased enrollment and decreased assessed valuation of the district.

For the 2007-08 school year the assessed valuation of the district was \$150,523,362 and for the 2016-17 school year the assessed valuation if \$151,194,313 which is only a 0.45% increase. During this same time period the state average increase is 4% and the Jefferson County school district average is over 5%. So while school districts across the state have seen assessed valuation grow by 4% the Dunklin R-5 School District has only grown by less than 1%. This leads to less local revenue.

During this time the district has also seen a change in enrollment and demographics. In the 2007-08 school year the district had 1345 students. This year the district has1571 students or a 16.8% increase in students. In 2007-08 school year the district only had 37.7% of students qualifying for free and reduced lunch and last year the district had 55.9% (The official percentage for this year has not been calculated by DESE yet but district calculation puts it over 53%). So while assessed valuation of the district has not grown at the same rate as the state average the district has undergone a dramatic increase in enrollment and students qualifying for free and reduced lunch. This has decreased the percentage of funds coming from local revenue.

During this time you have seen the tax rate increase but hopefully now you see a bigger picture in that while the tax rate has increased it has not kept the percentage of local revenue at the same level it was 10 years ago. During this time local revenue has decreased as a percentage of revenue while state revenue has increased. The Board of Education and I truly appreciate the commitment the local patrons have made to the district and local revenue is still our number 1 source of revenue. The district is in sound shape financially. The Board and I strive to be great stewards of the funds provided to the district and work to maintain the strong fiscal condition of the district.

Lorax were there as well as lot of Truffala Trees and other colorful decorations.




photo booth fun for the students and teachers as well.

Letter from the High School Administration

The school year is passing quickly as we are now in the 4th quarter. This year was our first year using Chromebooks and their use has been very productive for both students and staff. When you walk into a classroom today you see students using their Chromebooks to research information. The Chromebooks offer our students a variety of avenues in education that were not available in the past.

So far this year school was closed for inclement weather for two days. We will be making up the two days. School will be in session on Wednesday, March 12 and Friday, May 19. May 19, which is now the last day of the year, will be an early dismissal as school will end at 12:10.

The spring activity/sports season is underway. The band, choir, and musical performers as well as the baseball, golf, and track teams have been working hard preparing this time of year. Commencement is one of the most special events in a person's life. This event is a time for families to celebrate the accomplishment of their children. There will be information for seniors concerning graduation in the coming weeks. Seniors must make sure they are aware of and attend any meetings and to contact the office if they are absent the day of a meeting.

Another important time for the end of the year is End of Course (EOC) testing. EOCs are mandatory state assessments in certain core area subjects. These tests are part of a student's grade as well as an indicator into the instruction that is delivered to students in these core area subjects. Following is the EOC schedule along with some tips for parents that can help prepare their children for the EOCs.

- If you are anxious about your child's test, it's ok, but try to keep cool around your child, you don't want them to get anxious about the tests too.
- Encourage your child to do well but don't pressure him/her. You may stress him/ her out. It is important for your child to stay relaxed for the test.
- Keep a positive attitude about tests.
- Mark test days on your calendar so you and your child are both aware of testing dates.
- Make sure that your child gets enough sleep the night before the test.
- Ensure that your child eats a healthy breakfast and avoid heavy foods that may
 make him/her groggy and avoid high sugar foods that may make him/her hyper.
- Make sure that your child gets up early enough so that he/she will be on time to school.
- Let your child relax for a few hours before bedtime, it can be stressful for a child to study all night.
- Talking about the test with your child can relieve stress about test-taking.
- If your child is struggling on his/her tests, talk to him/her about it and meet with the teacher to find out the best way to help your child.
- Praise/reward your child when he/she does well on a test or for hard work preparing for a test.


